Keynote Speaker

**Dr. Meb Rashid, Medical Director, Crossroads Clinic
Women's College Hospital, University of Toronto
Moderated by Dr. Angela Tsai, Internal Medicine, PGY1**

Dr. Rashid has had the privilege of working with newly arrived refugees for nearly twenty years. He is the medical director of the Crossroads Clinic, a medical clinic that serves refugees arriving in Toronto. He also co-founded the Canadian Doctors for Refugee Care, an organization founded to advocate for refugees to access health insurance and was on the steering committee of the Canadian Collaboration for Immigrant and Refugee Health (CCIRH), a group that developed evidence-based guidelines for the assessment of newly arrived immigrants and refugees. He is a co-founder of the Christie Refugee Health Clinic, a health clinic located in a refugee shelter.

Dr. Rashid is on staff at Women's College Hospital in Toronto and is an Assistant Professor with the Department of Family and Community Medicine at the University of Toronto.

Progress and Hope in Global Health: Child Health

Dr. Zulfiqar Bhutta is the Robert Harding Inaugural Chair in Global Child Health and Policy at the Centre for Global Child Health, Toronto and the Distinguished University Professor and Founding Director of its Institute for Global Health and Development at the Aga Khan University, unique joint appointments. Dr Bhutta was the Founding Chair of the National Research Ethics Committee of the Government of Pakistan from 2003-2014 and a member of the UN Secretary General's Independent Expert Review Group for monitoring global progress in maternal and child health MDGs (2011-2015). Dr Bhutta is one of the most highly cited academics in global health and has been ranked among the top 1% of Highly Cited Researchers globally. He is a recipient of the WHO Family Health award, the World Academy of Sciences award in Medical Sciences and a member of the National Academy of Sciences, USA. He leads large research groups based in Canada and Pakistan with a special interest in research synthesis, scaling up evidence based interventions in community settings and implementation research in difficult circumstances and conflict settings.

Dr. Barry Pakes is a public health and preventive medicine physician with a practice focus in public health and global health education as well as public health and global health ethics. He is a graduate of the Public Health Preventive Medicine specialty training program at the University of Toronto and has degrees from McGill, Harvard, and the Gorgas Institute in Lima, Peru. He earned his PhD in Public Health Ethics as part of the Collaborative Program at the Joint Centre for Bioethics at the University of Toronto in 2014. Dr. Pakes has worked and taught in local and global public health settings including as a Senior Ethics Fellow at the WHO, acting Associate Medical Officer of Health at the City of Toronto, and in Ethiopia, Zimbabwe, Kerala and Israel. Dr. Pakes practices emergency medicine and primary care in Northern Ontario communities, is a travel clinic medical director and teaches medical residents at Mount Sinai Hospital. He is Medical Officer of Health, York Region and Director of the Preventive Medicine Residency Program, Dalla Lana School of Public Health plus the Global Health Academic Lead for Postgraduate Medical Education and Program Director for its Global Health Education Initiative.

Progress and Hope in Global Health: Indigenous Health

Roberta Pike is Anishinabekwe from Henvey Inlet First Nation and is a mother to a 16 year old son. She has been working in the Indigenous health and wellness space for the past thirty+ years.

Prior to her current appointment as Director, Indigenous Wellness, Reconciliation and Partnerships at Unity Health, she was the Executive Director of the Toronto Birth Centre, worked for the Ontario Public Service and worked in front line Indigenous community organizations in Toronto. She holds a BA (Hons.) in Psychology, and a BA (Hons.) in Native Human Services, both from Laurentian University; and a Master of Social Work from the University of Toronto.

ROUNDTABLE 4

Progress and Hope in Global Health: Equity, Diversity and Inclusion in Medical Education

Chika Stacy Oriuwa is a Canadian physician, spoken word artist, and advocate against systemic racism in health care. Oriuwa completed a BSc in Health Sciences from McMaster University, followed by a gap year to focus on poetry. In 2016, Dr. Oriuwa began a combined medical degree and Master of Science at Temerty Faculty of Medicine, where she was the only Black student in her class. In June 2020, Dr. Oriuwa graduated from the University of Toronto as valedictorian. She was the first solo black female valedictorian at University of Toronto, the second overall black female valedictorian, and the first women in 14 years.

In 2017, the University of Toronto created the Black Student Application Program (BSAP), an optional application process that requires the same standards and includes an interview process conducted by members of the Black community, faculty, and students. Dr. Oriuwa became an ambassador for the program. As of 2020, the incoming class of 2024 had 24 black students. During medical school, Dr. Oriuwa co-founded the Black Interprofessional Student's Association (BISPA) to network students across graduate programs. She also served as a strategic advisor and contributing writer to Healthy Debate, a health care journalism platform. She has said she uses poetry both as an outlet for her struggles with encountering racism and as a form of advocacy against it.

Dr. Oriuwa is currently a PGME Psychiatry PGY3 resident. She is co-director of Uflow, a non-profit youth leadership organization and was on the External Implementation Steering Committee to the Minister of Children and Youth Services, focused on shaping the Ontario Black Youth Action Plan.

Discussion led by Delaney Hines

Delaney Hines completed his Master of Public Health at the Western University Schulich School of Medicine Interfaculty program in Public Health. His interest in global health stems from his time supporting the Ethical, Social and Cultural (ESC) Program for the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation's Global Health and Global Development programs at St. Michael's Hospital and the International Network for Evaluating Outcomes (iNeo) of neonates at the Maternal-Infant Care Research Centre at Mount Sinai Hospital.

He is currently the Lead for Equity, Inclusion, Diversity, and Anti-Racism at Heart and Stroke. Mr. Hines has served as lead with Postgraduate Medical Education Global Health Education Initiative (GHEI) for residents and fellows from 2010 - 2019.

Professor Rebecca Cook, A.B., M.A., M.P.A., J.D., LL.M., J.S.D., is a Professor Emerita in the Faculty of Law, the Faculty of Medicine and the Joint Centre for Bioethics at the University of Toronto, and Co-Director, Reproductive and Sexual Health Law Program, University of Toronto. She is Legal and International Ethical Issues co-editor of the International Journal of Gynecology and Obstetrics and serves on the editorial advisory board of Human Rights Quarterly. Her published books include: *Frontiers of Gender Equality: Transnational Legal Perspectives* (2023), *Abortion Law in Transnational Perspective: Cases and Controversies* (2014); *Human Rights of Women: National and International Perspectives* (1994); and *Gender Stereotyping: Transnational Legal Perspectives* (2010). She is a Member of the Order of Canada, a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada, and the recipient of the Certificate of Recognition for Outstanding Contribution to Women's Health by the International Federation of Gynecology and Obstetrics (FIGO).

Progress and Hope in Global Health: Infectious Disease

Dr. Isaac Bogoch is an Associate Professor at the University of Toronto's Department of Medicine and a Clinician Investigator at the Toronto General Hospital Research Institute. At the University of Toronto, Dr. Bogoch received both his medical education and his residency training in internal medicine. Then he pursued an HIV fellowship at Massachusetts General Hospital and an infectious diseases fellowship through the Harvard Partners programme. In addition to a diploma in tropical medicine and hygiene from the Gorgas Memorial Institute and the Instituto de Medicina Tropical in Lima, Peru, he also holds a master's degree in clinical epidemiology from the Harvard School of Public Health. Tropical diseases, global health, and HIV prevention are the areas of clinical and research interest for Dr. Bogoch. He collaborates with a multidisciplinary team that works internationally to model threats to global health from new and reemerging infectious diseases. In addition, he creates and uses creative, straightforward diagnostic methods to raise the standard of care in settings with limited resources. In the HIV Prevention Unit, Dr. Bogoch also serves as a clinician-investigator with a focus on non-professional Post-Exposure Prophylaxis and Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis delivery models.

Dr. Nathan M. Stall received his medical degree from Western University and completed his residency in Internal Medicine and fellowship training in Geriatric Medicine at the University of Toronto. He was a research fellow at Women's College Research Institute at Women's College Hospital and completed a PhD in Clinical Epidemiology and Health Care Research at the Institute of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation (IHPE) at the University of Toronto. His research interests include using large administrative databases to study Ontario's long-term care system, the population health impact of caregiving for dementia, drug safety for older adults, sex- and gender-based determinants of ageing, and health care utilization among persons with dementia.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, he was actively involved in research modelling long-term care home outbreaks and the factors associated with outbreaks occurring and the spread of COVID-19 throughout homes. He served as the Assistant Scientific Director of Ontario's COVID-19 Science Advisory Table and a Network Science Advisor for CanCOVID. His doctoral research was supported by the University of Toronto Department of Medicine's Eliot Phillipson Clinician-Scientist Training Program and the Vanier Canada Graduate Scholarship. He has been a staff geriatrician at Sinai Health since 2017 and is a clinician scientist and assistant professor in the Department of Medicine at the University of Toronto. Dr. Stall attends on the inpatient Geriatric Medicine Consultation Service and on the Internal Medicine Clinical Teaching Units at Mount Sinai Hospital.

Dr. Leila Makhani (she/her) is a family physician with the Crossroads Refugee Clinic at Women's College Hospital and with the Inner City Health Associates (ICHA) in Toronto. Her clinical and academic interests include migrant and refugee health, the care of underserved populations, and global health in the context of primary care and building collaborative academic partnerships. Dr. Makhani also has interests in tropical medicine, sexual health and women's health. In her academic roles, Dr. Makhani serves as the PGY3 Enhanced Skills Program Director for the Global Health and Vulnerable Populations program, and is Associate Lead for the Toronto Addis Ababa Academic Collaboration in Family Medicine (TAAAC-FM), both at the Department of Family and Community Medicine with the University of Toronto. In addition, Dr. Makhani co-leads the Global Health week teaching for second year undergraduate medical students, which highlights foundational global health principles to include social accountability, equity, and social determinants of health. Outside of medicine, Dr. Makhani enjoys the arts and dance, and spending time with her toddler.

Dr. Praseedha Janakarim is a Family Physician Women's College Hospital Crossroads Refugee Clinic and an Assistant Professor at the Department of Family and Community Medicine (DFCM) at the University of Toronto. Her primary care practice includes the care of refugees and community-based HIV primary care with special interests in global health education, capacity-strengthening initiatives and partnerships. She has prior clinical experience in Malawi, Pakistan, Ethiopia, Nunavut and Yellowknife. Praseedha has held leadership roles at the University of Toronto, including Program Director of Enhanced Skills in Global Health at the Department of Family and Community Medicine, Acting Vice Chair Global Health and Social Accountability in 2019, and she is the current Faculty Lead for the Toronto Addis Ababa Academic Collaboration in Family Medicine.

Praseedha has recently been named Program Director for Global Health Education and is the Theme Co-Lead of the New and Evolving Academic Leaders Program at the Center for Faculty Development at the University of Toronto. She is Co-Chair for the innovative new program Advancing Women Excellence in Family Medicine (AWE-FM) which launched at the DFCM in October 2023 with the aim of elevating early and mid-career women physicians in global family medicine leadership. Her passion for her work and engagement have been recognized through numerous awards in education, leadership, and global health.
