Keynote Speaker

Ms. Anuradha Gupta, Deputy Chief Executive Officer, Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance

Since joining Gavi in 2015, Anuradha has led efforts to put equity and gender at the centre of Gavi's programmatic planning and to tailor support to countries within Gavi's strategy. She has also driven efforts to create a new model of country-level Alliance support, through the establishment of the partners' engagement framework (PEF). At the same time, Anuradha has helped to improve country ownership and leadership of Gavi-supported programmes while enhancing accountability for results. In 2019, Gavi received the prestigious Lasker~Bloomberg Public Service Award for providing sustained access to childhood vaccines in the world's poorest countries, saving millions of lives and highlighting the power of immunisation to prevent diseases.

Prior to Gavi, Anuradha served as Mission Director of the National Health Mission of India, where she ran the largest – and possibly most complex – public health programme in the world with an annual budget of US\$ 3.5 billion. A passionate and influential advocate of women, young girls and children, Anuradha played a leading role in India's efforts to eradicate polio transmission, reduce maternal and child mortality and revitalise primary health care.

Anuradha has contributed towards a number of important global health initiatives. She served as a member of the Steering Committee for Child Survival Call to Action, co-chaired the Stakeholder Group for the 2012 London Summit on Family Planning and was a member of the Family Planning 2020 (FP2020) Reference Group. Anuradha served as Co-Chair of the Partnership for Maternal, Newborn & Child Health (PMNCH) and is currently a member of the PMNCH Board. She also played a role in shaping the Global Financing Facility (GFF) and is a member of the GFF Investors Group. From 2015-2018, Anuradha served on the Merck for Mothers Advisory Board.

Anuradha holds an MBA from the University of Wollongong in Australia and received executive education from the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University, Stanford Graduate School of Business and Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University. In 2015, she was named one of "300 Women Leaders in Global Health" by the Global Health Centre of the Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies.

ROUNDTABLE 1

Dr. Kenneth Fung and Dr. Lisa Andermann

Equity, Compassion, Lessons Learned: Mental Health

Dr. Kenneth Fung is a Staff Psychiatrist and Clinical Director of the Asian Initiative in Mental Health Program at the Toronto Western Hospital, University Health Network. He is also Associate Professor with Equity, Gender, and Populations and Global Health Lead, Division at the Department of Psychiatry, University of Toronto. He completed a two-year fellowship in Cultural Psychiatry at the University of Toronto, and his Master thesis was on alexithymia among Chinese Canadians. His primary research, teaching, and clinical interests include both cultural psychiatry and psychotherapy.

Dr. Lisa Andermann, together with Dr. Kenneth Fung, are co-leads of the Department of Psychiatry's Pillar 4 of the Strategic Plan (DIALOGUE). This Pillar focuses on issues regarding equity, social justice, and social responsibility, promoting dialogue to reduce stigma and promote public engagement with mental health issues. Dr. Andermann has been developing postgraduate training dealing with issues social responsibility, cultural psychiatry and global mental health. Cultural Psychiatry Day, which has now expanded into a national videoconference linking 6 universities across Canada, and Advocacy Day are two examples of ongoing educational events for psychiatry residents in these areas.

In addition to her work at the Mount Sinai Ethnocultural ACT team and Psychological Trauma Clinic, Dr. Lisa Andermann is a Consultant Psychiatrist at the Canadian Centre for Victims of Torture (ICHA); and with the Northern Psychiatric Outreach Program (NPOP-C) providing outreach to remote communities on Baffin Island. She has been involved with the Toronto-Addis Ababa Psychiatry Program (TAAPP) since its inception, assisting in the development of the first psychiatry residency training program in Ethiopia. Dr. Andermann recently co-edited a book entitled *Refuge and Resilience: Promoting Resilience and Mental Health Among Refugees and Forced Migrants* (Springer, 2014).

ROUNDTABLE 2

Dr. Onil Bhattacharyya

Equity, Compassion, Lessons Learned: Local, Global Healthcare Innovation

Dr. Bhattacharyya is Senior Scientist, Women's College Research Institute, Frigon-Blau Chair in Family Medicine Research, Women's College Hospital Family Physician, Women's College Hospital, Associate Professor, Department of Family & Community Medicine, University of Toronto and Associate Professor, Institute of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation, University of Toronto.

Digital health strategies have the potential to empower patients and transform healthcare services, but it is not clear how these technologies should be regulated and endorsed within our healthcare system. Evaluations of digital tools have shown variable results, and there is a lot of uncertainty around what constitutes a successful digital tool. Dr. Onil Bhattacharyya, Frigon-Blau Chair in Family Medicine Research, works closely with policy makers and system partners to evaluate new virtual care models that address system needs and are poised to scale, particularly for patients with complex needs. Digital health is a very dynamic area that uses methods from the design, software and startup industries to develop person-centered services that can increase access and comprehensiveness of care while improving experience and reducing costs. Even when there are noticeable benefits, uptake of digital tools has been limited as they may increase workload for providers and costs for organizations in the short term.

Dr. Bhattacharyya's research focuses on implementing new virtual care models within a particular clinical context and modifying them until he finds a balance between benefits and barriers for both patients and providers. Addressing factors such as the right features, which clinical model it supports, who is likely to benefit and what types of benefits can be expected help to improve a tool's successful implementation. Currently, Dr. Bhattacharyya's research is leading evaluations of virtual visits in primary care, remote monitoring in chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, care coordination for frail elderly people in rural areas and eye screening for diabetes using digital cameras in primary care to improve health outcomes for patients with complex needs. These digital health tools could dramatically improve care for patients with complex conditions who have difficulty leaving the home, as well as patients with few health problems that want quick and convenient solutions.

Dr. Chase Everett McMurren

Equity, Compassion, Lessons Learned: Indigenous Health

Dr. Chase Everett McMurren [he & him & his] has Michif (Métis), Celtic, French and Ukrainian ancestors. Originally from Southern Alberta on traditional Blackfoot Confederacy territory, he's been living in Tkarón:to | GichiKiiwenging | Toronto for years. His clan is the Turtle and his spirit name is Water Song Medicine Keeper. Chase is a harp-playing, home-visiting physician for long-living elders, and an integrative medical psychotherapist for artists. Chase serves as the Indigenous Health Education Theme Lead in the MD Program & as the Indigenous Health Practitioner Community of Support Lead in the Office of Indigenous Health within the Temerty Faculty of Medicine.

He serves as an Assessor and Clinical Supervisor for the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, and also provides supervision in the Psychotherapy Training Program offered through the Medical Psychotherapy Association Canada (MDPAC). Chase is training as a Nîkawihôwêw* [not-a-way-who-ee-oo], or Medicine Man (*in Michif) and is a certified practitioner of the Hakomi Method. Chase is honoured to co-chair the National Consortium for Indigenous Medical Education (NCIME) Working Group on Physician Wellness and Joy in Work.

ROUNDTABLE 4

Dr. Nabihah Islam

Equity, Compassion, Lessons Learned: Migrant Health

Dr. Nabihah Islam completed medical school and residency at the University of Toronto. She is currently a staff Internal Medicine physician at the Scarborough Health Network - Birchmount Hospital in Toronto. She also provides medical care in refugee camps and conflict zones, including on the Syrian-Jordanian border, on the Venezuelan-Colombian border, on the island of Lesbos in Greece, on the Bosnian-Croatian border, and in northern Pakistan. She has spent the greatest amount of her time volunteering in the Rohingya refugee camps in Bangladesh, where she witnessed firsthand the aftermath of genocide in 2017 as one of only a few physicians in the camps in the early days of the crisis.

Dr. Billie-Jo Hardy

Equity, Compassion, Lessons Learned: Global Health Governance, Colonialism

Dr. Billie-Jo Hardy is an Assistant Professor at the Waakebiness Institute for Indigenous Health at the Dalla Lana School of Public Health at the University of Toronto where she leads Indigenous health research projects in partnership with Indigenous communities. Her research interests include Indigenous and global public health research and implementation, innovation sciences, health equity and research ethics. Dr. Hardy is a member of the Ethics Review Board at Public Health Ontario, the Unity Health Research Ethics Board and the First Nation, Metis, Inuit and Indigenous Community Advisory Panel at Unity Health Toronto. Dr. Hardy started her career as a research fellow at the Sandra Roman Centre for Global Health Research, specializing in research ethics, global health and innovation sciences. She has advised global health agencies and foundations, including the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, PATH and Grand Challenges Canada.

Mr. Joe Belliveau

Equity Compassion, Lessons Learned: Medicines Sans Frontieres (MSF Canada)

Mr. Joe Belliveau, is current Executive Director Doctors without Borders Canada. He first joined MSF Canada as a field logistician in 2000, when he worked in a refugee camp in eastern Zambia. He pursued subsequent field assignments on the front lines of the organization's humanitarian emergency response efforts in Democratic Republic of Congo, Liberia, Ivory Coast, Sierra Leone, Pakistan and Zimbabwe, before overseeing MSF's field operations from headquarters in Europe. Over the course of his career with MSF, Belliveau has helped the organization respond to a wide variety of humanitarian crises created by armed conflict, disease outbreaks and natural disasters. Throughout his years with MSF, and also through his recent role as Program Director with Conflict Dynamics International, Belliveau developed particular expertise in managing and supporting teams seeking to provide humanitarian and medical care to people in need. Belliveau is a champion of MSF's advocacy work, including speaking out against international policies and global actions that cause human suffering or that interfere with humanitarian medical relief. He is an engaging public speaker and an accomplished writer on topics concerning the management of humanitarian projects in complex environments. Belliveau is bilingual and holds a Master's degree in International Relations from the University of Toronto.

Dr. Sharmistha Mishra

Equity, Compassion, Lessons Learned: Modelling

An infectious diseases physician and Canada Research Chair in Mathematical Modeling and Program Science, **Dr. Sharmistha Mishra** is an international leader in mathematical modelling and epidemiology of HIV and other STIs. After completing medical school and residency training at the University of Toronto, Dr. Mishra obtained a Masters of Science degree in epidemiology and a Doctor of Philosophy in mathematical modelling at Imperial College London. Dr. Mishra is a scientist with MAP Centre for Urban Health Solutions in the Li Ka Shing Knowledge Institute of St. Michael's Hospital, and a clinician-scientist in St. Michael's Hospital's Division of Infectious Disease in the Department of Medicine. She is an assistant professor in the University of Toronto's Department of Medicine, and has graduate appointments with the Institute of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation and Institute of Medical Sciences. Dr. Praseedha Janakiram

Equity, Compassion, Lessons Learned: Local Refugee Health

Dr. Praseedha Janakiram is a family physician at Women's College Hospital's Crossroads Refugee Clinic and an Assistant Professor at the University of Toronto. With Sri Lankan origins, Dr. Janakiram immigrated to Canada after a youth spent in West Africa – an upbringing that inspired her primary care practice interest in the care of refugees, with a focus on women's health and HIV primary care.

In addition to work with Crossroads, Dr. Janakiram is also the Program Director of the Enhanced Skills Residency Year in Global Health and Vulnerable Populations at the Department of Family and Community Medicine at the University of Toronto, and serves as the Program Lead for the Toronto Addis Ababa Academic Collaboration in Family Medicine – an innovative collaboration that is supporting the development of the first family medicine training program in Ethiopia. Dr. Janakiram recently completed a six-month secondment as Acting Vice Chair in Global Health and Social Accountability with the Department of Family and Community Medicine, representing Women's College Hospital in this leadership role.
