GLOBAL HEALTH LEADERS IN DISCUSSION

Colleen Flood is a Canada Research Chair in Health Law and Policy. She was the Scientific Director of the Canadian Institutes of Health Research, Institute of Health Services and Policy Research, from 2006 to 2011. She is a Professor of Law at the University of Toronto and is cross-appointed into the Department of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation and the School of Public Policy. Professor Flood obtained her B.A. and LL.B. (Honours) from the University of Auckland, New Zealand and her LL.M. and SJD from the University of Toronto, Canada. Her primary area of scholarship is in comparative health care policy, public/private financing of health care systems, health care reform, and accountability and governance issues more broadly. She has been consulted on comparative health policy and governance issues by both the Senate Social Affairs Committee studying health care in Canada and by the Commission on the Future of Health Care in Canada (the Romanow Commission). She is the author of numerous articles, book chapters, and reports as well as the author and editor of eight books including on *Just Medicare: What's In, What's Out, How We Decide* (editor) (Toronto: UTP, 2006); *Access to Care, Access to Justice: The Legal Debate Over Private Health Insurance in Canada* (Toronto: University of Toronto Press, 2005) (co-edited with Kent Roach and Lorne Sossin); *Canadian Health Law and Policy* (2nd edition, Butterworths, 2002) (co-edited with Jocelyn Downie & T. Caulfield) and *International Health Care Reform: A Legal, Economic and Political Analysis*, (Routledge: London, 2000).

Kelly MacDonald received her Bachelors Degree from Queen's University in 1983 and her Medical Degree from the University of Manitoba in 1987. She was trained in Internal Medicine at the University of Washington, and is certified in Microbiology and Infectious Diseases. She did her post-doctoral training at the University of Manitoba and the University of Toronto. Dr. MacDonald is the Director of the HIV Research Program and holder of the Ontario HIV Treatment Network (OHTN) Endowed Chair in HIV Research at the University of Toronto. She is an Associate Professor of Medicine and a practicing Microbiologist. As a clinician scientist her research interests include the studies of the role of human leucocyte antigens (HLA) in mediating resistance to HIV and Hepatitis C and their role in viral vaccine design. She has focused on the use of DNA immunization as a vaccine strategy and the use of anti-HLA alloimmune responses as well as T cell epitopes as novel targets for HIV vaccine development. She supervises research labs in Toronto and in Nairobi, Kenya where she has graduate students and post-doctoral fellows involved in studies of the immunobiology and epidemiology of HIV infection. She is the research representative on the Board of the Ontario HIV Treatment Network. She has served as a member of the Federal Ministerial Council on HIV/AIDS and is currently the co-chair of the HIV vaccine track of the Canadian Vaccine Network (CANVAC).

Douglas Sinclair Executive Vice President and Chief Medical Officer, St. Michael's Hospital. After a 22-year hiatus in Nova Scotia, Dr. Doug Sinclair rejoined St. Michael's in 2010 where his medical career first began. Following his graduation from the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Toronto in 1980, Dr. Sinclair completed his clerkship in Toronto, became chief resident of Emergency Medicine at U of T and an attending staff emergency physician at St. Michael's. After that, Dr. Sinclair spent two decades in Halifax in a number of progressive leadership and academic roles, including founding head of the Department of Emergency Medicine at Dalhousie University Faculty of Medicine, vice-president of Medical Services at the Queen Elizabeth II Health Sciences Centre and most recently, associate dean of Continuing Education in the Faculty of Medicine at Dalhousie University. Dr. Sinclair returned to St. Michael's in 2010 as executive vice-president and chief medical officer. "St. Michael's is a place that has the opportunity to really close that gap that frustrates most academic clinicians in moving research discoveries to patient care," he says. "I am very impressed by the commitment and focus of the staff at St. Michael's - their enthusiasm for their work is palpable."

Raghu Venugopal practices emergency medicine at the Toronto General Hospital and Toronto Western Hospital. He is an Assistant Professor at the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Toronto. He completed his medical specialization at McGill University, public health training at Harvard University, and international emergency medicine research fellowship at Johns Hopkins University. He has served on the Board Director of Medecins Sans Frontieres Canada. He has completed 2 field missions with MSF-Holland, in Burundi and the Central African Republic. He has also worked with governments in the Palestinian Territories and Tanzania to improve emergency services, in the Balkans during refugee crises, and is involved with the University of Toronto Addis Ababa Academic Collaboration to initiate an emergency medicine training program in Ethiopia. He was given the 2010 University of Toronto Outstanding Clinical Teacher in the EM residency program.

DINNER WITH LEADERS

Carol Devine is a humanitarian, research and writer. As Program Manager for The Museum of AIDS in Africa she helped launch the museum's first public program, Virtual Memorial at the International Conference on AIDS and STIs in Cape Town, Dec, 2013. Carol worked for Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) Canada as the Access to Essential Medicines Campaigner, and Program Director. She did humanitarian affairs for MSF in Rwanda, Southern Sudan and East Timor. Carol has consulted to The Stephen Lewis Foundation and AIDS-Free World and is a founding board member of Dignitas International. For Dignitas' program in Malawi Carol initiated the first multi-sector (medical-legal-social) network to respond to gender-based violence and improve health outcomes. She recently wrote a feature on Circumpolar and Global Health in the Canadian Society for Circumpolar Health publication. www.caroldevine.info.

Philip Berger is Medical Director of St. Michael's Hospital, Inner City Health Program in Toronto. He is an Associate Professor in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Toronto. He has published and lectured widely on critical health issues including drug addiction, the physical and psychological effects of torture and HIV/AIDS. During his career, he founded the Canadian Medical Network – Amnesty International (English), and was a founding member of the Canadian Centre for Victims of Torture, the Medical Reform Group of Ontario, the Ontario HIV Project Centre Primary Care Mentor Program, and the Toronto HIV Primary Care Physicians Group, of which he was also the Chair for 6 years. In 2004-2005 he was the first team leader for the Ontario Hospital Association's AIDS Initiative (OHAfrica Project) which twinned Canadian health care professionals with the first publicly funded AIDS clinic in Lesotho – call the Tsepong (Place of Hope) Clinic. In 2012 Dr. Berger cofounded Canadian Doctors for Refugee Care, a group of physicians and residents who have participated in protests and other activities to oppose cuts to refugee health care in Canada.

Bruce Lampard has worked overseas for many years with the international medical humanitarian organization, Médecins Sans Frontières / Doctors Without Borders (MSF). This work took him to Nigeria, Afghanistan, Burundi, eastern DRC, Chad, Central African Republic and Somalia, in projects ranging from primary health care supervision to hospital start-up work, and from conflict zones to refugee camps. Bruce holds a masters degree in International Affairs, where he specialized in humanitarian action and conflict. He practiced medicine in Nunavut for several years before settling in Toronto. He is currently an emergency physician at the University Health Network, and President of the Board of Directors of MSF in Canada.

Zayna Khayat is Senior Advisor in Health System Innovation at the MaRS Discovery District. In this capacity she is also the Director of the MaRS EXCITE pre-market health technology evaluation program. Dr. Khayat was previously with the International Centre for Health Innovation at Ivey, where she currently is Adjunct Faculty. She is also adjunct professor at the Rotman School of Management. Zayna has a PhD in biochemistry from University of Toronto.

Sumeet Sodhi is a research Scientist at Dignitas International. She is also a staff physician with the Toronto Western Hospital Family Health Team at the University Health Network and an Assistant Professor in the Department of Family and Community Medicine at the University of Toronto, where she received her undergraduate and postgraduate medical education. She completed her MD in 1997, family medicine residency in 1999 and low-risk obstetrics fellowship in 2000. As well, she obtained her Master of Public Health degree from Harvard University in 2006. Sumeet has extensive experience working as a field doctor, program consultant and researcher in global health and resource-poor contexts, primarily in Africa, Asia and Canada's northern communities. She has been affiliated with Dignitas International since 2006, where she has been instrumental in building operational research capacity in the organization by championing integration of the research and program departments. Sumeet's current research interests include evaluating HIV/AIDS and primary care service delivery models in resource-poor settings, developing and evaluating knowledge translation tools to support health care workers in clinical management of HIV/AIDS and primary care conditions, and in observational cohort analysis of patients enrolled in antiretroviral treatment programs in sub-Saharan Africa.

Jason Pennington believes that the phenomenon of increasingly prolific Aboriginal students and scholars is a very important one. Pennington initially came to the University of Toronto in 1990 to study as an aerospace engineer but after two years he came to the realization that this was not going to be his path in life. It was around this time that First Nations House came into existence and he started spending a lot of time in the North Borden Building. With the help of FNH staff member, Diane Longboat, he made the

switch to Arts and Science for a career in medicine. After finishing his Arts and Science degree and a Masters in Botany (which focused on anti cancer drugs in plants), Pennington was introduced to the Native Students Association and became very active. “I found a sense of camaraderie because we had similar perspectives, and I could relate well with the other Native students in the University.” Dr. Pennington is now a staff surgeon at Scarborough General Hospital and an adjunct professor at the University of Toronto. He goes up North every year to smaller Aboriginal communities to practice for a week or two and speaks to the youth about the benefits of post secondary education. Dr. Jason Pennington is a General Surgeon at the Scarborough Hospital, Lecturer in the Department of Surgery and Curricular co-Lead in Indigenous Health Education at the Faculty of Medicine, University of Toronto.

GLOBAL HEALTH EDUCATION KEYNOTE

Brian Hodges, Professor of Psychiatry, University of Toronto and Vice-President Education, University Health Network graduated from Queen’s University Medical School in 1989, completed psychiatry residency at the University of Toronto in 1994, a Master’s of Higher Education in 1995 and a PhD in 2007. Since 2003, he has been Director of the University of Toronto Wilson Centre, one of the largest centres for health professional education research in the world. From 2004-2008 he was Chair of Evaluation for at the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons, overseeing assessment in the 62 specialty programs in Canada. Internationally he has worked with medical schools and licensure organizations in New Zealand, Switzerland, Poland, Japan, Jordan, Israel, France, China, Australia and Ethiopia. In 2003 he spent a year at the University of Paris, earning a diploma in Health Economics and Social Sciences and established collaborations with the University of Paris and the Ecole des Hautes Etudes en Santé Publique (EHESP) where he continues to serve as a member of the education board. He was named Full Professor and Richard and Elizabeth Currie Chair in Health Professions Education Research at University of Toronto in 2009.

Leslie Shanks is the former (2008 - 2013) Medical Director of Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) based in Amsterdam. A family physician, she joined MSF in 1994 and has worked in a number of countries including the Former Yugoslavia, Zaire/Democratic Republic of Congo, Liberia and the Sudan. She joined the board of MSF-Canada in 1998, and was elected president from 2001-2004. In Canada she worked and lived in Aboriginal communities in northern Ontario and Nunavut, worked in the federal penitentiaries in Kingston, and from 2002-2004 was Medical Director at the Sherbourne Health Centre in Toronto. She completed her Master’s Degree in Public Health at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore. Her publications include work on sexual violence, HIV and MDR-TB in resource-limited settings, evaluation of mental health interventions in humanitarian contexts and prevention of malnutrition.
