GLOBAL HEALTH DAY SPEAKER PROFILES

Dr. James Orbinski is a humanitarian practitioner and a leading scholar in global health. He believes in humanitarianism, in citizenship and in actively engaging and shaping the world in which we live, so that it is more humane, fair and just. Dr. Orbinski is CIGI Research Chair in Global Health at the Balsillie School of International Affairs, and professor of International Policy and Governance at Wilfrid Laurier University. At the University of Toronto, which he joined in 2003, he is full professor of Medicine at the Dalla Lana School of Public Health, and Senior Fellow at both Massey College, and the Munk School of Global Affairs.

In 1986-87 Dr. Orbinski lived in Sub-Saharan Africa researching HIV/AIDS in children under a Canadian Medical Research Council Fellowship. He has extensive field experience with Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF), having worked as a medical doctor in Peru (91) and Brazil (92), and as MSF's medical co-coordinator in Baidoa Somalia during the 92-93 civil war and famine, and in Jalalabad, Afghanistan in 1993-94 during the civil war. He led MSF's mission in Kigali, Rwanda during the 1994 genocide and civil war, and in Goma, Zaire during the 1996-97 civil war and refugee crisis. After completing a Masters Degree in International Relations, he was elected international president of MSF from 1998 to 2001. During this time, he launched MSF's Access to Essential Medicines Campaign (1998) and accepted the Nobel Peace Prize awarded to MSF in 1999. From 2001 to 2004 he co-chaired MSF's Neglected Diseases Working Group, which in 2004 launched the not-for-profit Drugs for Neglected Diseases Initiative (DNDi). Since then, he has remained on the board of the DNDI which has developed and delivered 6 new treatments and has 17 others in its pipeline for Chagas disease, leishmaniasis, and malaria, while building sustainable research capacity in disease-endemic countries. In 2004, Dr. Orbinski co-founded Dignitas International, which is now supporting over 200,000 people with full treatment for HIV, and is scaling up its Primary Health Care treatment model to serve a population of 3 million in Malawi. Dignitas also has established an extensive research capacity, with over forty major publications focused on improving health systems in the developing world. Some of Dr. Orbinski's research is recognized as among the "best science in the world" (in 2006),^[i] and as having "shaped scholarship in the field of global health in the post Second World War years".^[ii] He is also the author of the award-winning and best-selling book, *An Imperfect Offering: Humanitarianism in the 21st Century* (Bloomsbury, 2009). The book has since been translated into five languages. He was the subject of the award winning 2008 documentary film, *Triage: Dr. James Orbinski's Humanitarian Dilemma*.

Dr. Orbinski has served on the founding boards of the Global Alliance for TB Drug Development, the Stephen Lewis Foundation and Canadian Doctors for Medicare. He is a founding member of the editorial boards of *Open Medicine* and *Conflict and Health*. Dr. Orbinski is a member of the Climate Change and Health Council and the World Economic Forum's Global Agenda Council on Health Care Systems and Cooperation. Dr. Orbinski is a member of the Order of Ontario and an Officer of the Order of Canada. In 2011, he was the recipient of the Tarnopolsky Human Rights Award (awarded by the Canadian Superior Court Judges Association, the International Commission of Jurists {Canada}, the Canadian Bar Association, and the Canadian Association of Law Teachers), in recognition for his outstanding contributions to domestic and international human rights. He was also awarded the 2012 Canadian Civil Liberties Award of Excellence.

Dr. Mark Wainberg is a preeminent Canadian HIV/AIDS researcher and global health activist. He is the Director of the McGill University AIDS Centre at the Montreal Jewish General Hospital and Professor of Medicine and of Microbiology at McGill University. Wainberg and his collaborators were the first to identify the antiviral capabilities of 3TC in 1989 and test the drug in patients. 3TC is also called lamivudine. Wainberg was President of the International AIDS Society and in 2016, inducted into the Canadian Medical Hall of Fame.

Dr. Saleem Kassam earned his medical degree and Masters in Clinical Epidemiology at the University of Toronto, and went on to specialize in general and interventional cardiology. He currently practices at the Rouge Valley Health System. He has been involved with Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) since 1999 in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Kenya, Zambia and Haiti, as field doctor and medical team lead/ project coordinator. He is currently the Vice President of MSF Canada Board of Directors.



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Dr. Joseph Wong (PhD) is Professor of Innovation at the Munk School of Global Affairs, Professor of Political Science, and Canada Research Chair in Health, Democracy and Development. He was the Director of the Asian Institute at the Munk School from 2005 to 2014. He is the co-editor, with Edward Friedman, of *Political Transitions in Dominant Party Systems: Learning to Lose*, published by Routledge, and Wong recently co-edited with Dilip Soman and Janice Stein *Innovating for the Global South* with the University of Toronto Press. Professor Wong has been a visiting scholar at institutions in the US (Harvard), Taiwan, Korea, and the UK (Oxford); has worked extensively with the World Bank and the UN; and has advised governments on matters of public policy in Asia, Africa, the Americas, and Europe. Wong's current research focuses on poverty and innovation.

Dr. James Maskalyk is an emergency physician who worked during 2007 in Sudan and subsequent author of "Six Months in Sudan." Since then, Maskalyk has worked with Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) as physician and journalist, most recently in the refugee camp in Dadaab, Kenya. Maskalyk practices emergency medicine at St. Michael's Hospital in Toronto and University of Toronto faculty. He is also director of a program that works with Ethiopian partners at Addis Ababa University to train East Africa's first emergency physicians.

Dr. Lee Errett is Professor of Global Surgery, Department of Surgery at University of Toronto and former chief and senior member of the Division of Cardiovascular Surgery at St Michael's Hospital. He is founder of the Fellowship in International Surgery at St Michael's Hospital and has been instrumental in the training of surgeons from around the globe, all of whom have returned to their home countries.

Dr. Anna Dare is a general surgery resident at University of Toronto with interest in access and equity in surgical care among indigenous populations and in low resource settings. She currently is a commissioner on the Lancet Commission on Global Surgery, and leads the cancer surgery chapter for the Disease Control Priorities Network.

Dr. Meb Rashid is medical director of the Women's College Hospital Crossroads Clinic, a medical clinic that serves newly arrived refugees in Toronto. He is a co-founder of the Canadian Doctors for Refugee Care, an organization founded to advocate for refugees to access health insurance. He was on the steering committee of the Canadian Collaboration for Immigrant and Refugee Health, a group that developed evidence based guidelines for the assessment of newly arrived immigrants and refugees. He also co-founded the Christie Refugee Health Clinic, a health clinic located in a refugee shelter.

Mr. Michel Chikwanine is currently a University of Toronto political science and African studies student who at the age of five, was kidnapped from a village football field in his home country of the Democratic Republic of Congo and forced to become a child soldier. He is committed to share his story and experience to illicit discussion across disciplines. Chikwanine has recently published a children's novel titled "Child Soldier: When Boys and Girls Are Used in War."

Dr. David Naylor is University of Toronto President and Faculty of Medicine Emeritus; developed the proposal for the Institute for Clinical Evaluative Sciences and was the Institute's inaugural President and Chief Executive Officer. Appointed by past Minister of Health as Chair of the Advisory Panel on Healthcare Innovation with the Panel's report, *Unleashing Innovation: Excellence for Healthcare in Canada* delivered in July 2015. He was lead contributor on the Lancet Commission on "Health professionals for a new century: transforming education to strengthen health systems in an interdependent world."

Dr. Lisa Richardson is an award-winning clinician-educator in the University of Toronto's Division of General Internal Medicine. Her academic interest lies in the integration of critical, non-bioscientific perspectives into medical education. She currently practices at the Toronto Western Hospital where she is Site Director for the Core Internal Medicine Residency Program. She is Faculty co-Lead in Indigenous Medical Education for the University of Toronto Faculty of Medicine and is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Medicine. Richardson is a 2014 Associated Medical Services Phoenix Fellow and is currently a member of the University of Toronto wide steering committee contributing to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's Call to Action.
